# Baby Books

#### **Introduction by Eric Carle**

I DIDN'T have many books as a child, but I have very fond memories of sitting on my father's lap while he read the Sunday funny pages to me. It is the closeness with my father, the connection we shared that made the most lasting impact. I feel strongly that by taking your child on to your lap, holding them close while you read to them, you are letting them know by this simple act that you care for them, have time for them and love them. Then sharing a book becomes more than pages with words and pictures.

It has been said about my books that they are for the 'not-yet or about-to-be reader'. I love this idea that children at all levels and ages can enjoy the pictures, the colours and the rhythm of the words. There is something for every child – the baby who enjoys the sound of their parent's voice or the shapes on the page – and something for the first grader who might be starting to read, beginning to recognize letters and words.

I learned from Bill Martin Jr [author of *Brown Bear*, *Brown Bear*, *What Do You See*? – see page 17] about the importance of rhythm and repetition in books for children, the heartbeat rhythm of the text. Children before they are born are close to the heartbeat of their mother, which must have an influence on them.

There is so much we can offer our children at an early age. The warmth of our touch, the soothing sound of our voices, colourful pictures and all that is around to see and touch. There are so many wonderful books for babies by many talented artists and writers. I hope you will find much comfort and closeness in sharing a book with your child.

# How to read to your baby

IT REALLY IS never too soon to share books with your baby. There's a growing belief that reading to the baby in the womb helps the development of a calm personality and a sense of rhythm.

#### Why do it?

- Most brain development happens in the first three years of life.
- Babies need stimulation as much as they need food, so sing, talk, tell stories, chant rhymes – and READ!
- Babies need language, and authors are so good at using it – vocabulary grows through reading.
- It's about communication too one of the earliest things a baby responds to is the sound of the voice of someone who loves them and is a big part of their world.
- Sharing books regularly helps adult and baby to bond.
- Listening and concentration are big skills; babies grow through book-sharing.
- Children who know how books work, who are used to listening to stories and rhymes and who

see books as a normal part of life are likely to have a good start at school. (Check out the Bookstart research at www.bookstart.org.uk)

Most important of all – it's a pleasure for child and adult alike.

#### Reading together . . . Getting into the habit

- Settle down in a comfortable place every day.
- Go for two books you choose one and your child chooses one.
- Be happy to read favourite books endlessly! This gives security as well as pleasure.
- Encourage joining in rhyming words at the end of lines, turning the pages, lifting the flaps, etc.
- Point to and talk about the pictures; children soon learn that the words and pictures work together to tell the story.
- Remember, reading together is not quiet time – be ready to use funny voices, make animal sounds as the book requires, and to laugh and talk a lot.

**READING** to your children is one of the cuddliest, most memorable things you can do for them. Armed with a favourite picture book, I reminded my son of this, seconds before he threw me out of his room and reminded me that he was nineteen.

The truth is I yearn for the days when I could curl up with my kids and a book, laughing until we cried, crying until we laughed. 'Again!' they would beg. 'Read it again!'

So I'd read it again and again, and did I get bored? No, because the trick is to hide the dreary books in the dustbin and share the ones you both love together – it has to be good for all parties.

What makes a great picture book? Beware, small children aren't always the best judges. Mine didn't give a monkey's about literary merit, it was me and my soul that they wanted; the book – any book – was just a bonus. But while any book is better than no book, if you want a good one, my rule of thumb is this: if it makes you grin, sob or gasp, it's probably a corker. On the other hand, if it makes you groan, yawn or scream, it's either badly written or it's way past your bedtime.

Talking of which, there was many a night when I felt much too busy

and knackered to read to the little darlings, but, actually, that was the best time to do it. Once I'd settled with a kid in one arm, a book in the other, and we'd both stopped throwing our toys out of the pram, I realized that this was the best part of the day. The best thing about being a parent.

And, according to my great big burly son, it was the best thing about being a child.

## Young Fiction Introduction by Jeremy Strong

I TAUGHT 7–9-year-olds for many years. This is when most children master the basics of reading. They become independent readers, able to read increasingly sophisticated books on their own. What a fabulous feeling that is – like passing your driving test! Now you can explore the world of your books ON YOUR OWN!

#### But what should they be reading?

First, let me say this: children, like adults, like to read at different levels. PLEASE don't tell your child that something they want to read is too young or too old, has too many pictures, or no pictures. After all, nobody takes away your copy of

HELLO! magazine! (Or GQ, Vogue, Homes & Gardens, etc.) About the only good reason for not reading something is because the subject matter may be unsuitable - for example, it contains teenage/adult matter that your child may not be ready for. But children (and many adults) of all ages love, for example, picture stories. Don't deny your child the pleasure of these. Equally, comic-strip stories like Raymond Brigg's The Snowman, Hergé's Adventures of Tintin. the Asterix series – these and many like them are devoured by eager children.

If you want to encourage your child, you need to feed them books.

Find a few that look interesting – fact and fiction, poetry too. Leave them around and see what happens. If they show an interest in one type, get more. Your local library has regular copies of helpful magazines about children's books. Librarians are pretty good at recommending stuff too.

Above all, talk to your child about books to see what they like most. It might be pony stories, funny books, horror, jokes, facts – whatever. Feed the interest first – a more sophisticated taste will develop in time. However you choose to help your child, remember that children take their cues from us. If we appear bored, they will learn to be bored by the same things.

Your child is also just the right age for *Puffin Post*. This brilliant little

fifty-page mag comes packed with info, articles, games and more about books, writers and so on. It comes out six times a year and with each copy you get to choose a free book.

Reading ANYTHING is the most important and common way in which we easily increase our learning and awareness. It's effortless. Even if we try to read something we don't enjoy, we are learning something, and probably won't repeat that particular experience. Personally speaking I have never got into *The Lord of the Rings*! (But that didn't put my son off reading it – it's his favourite.) By showing your own interest in the world of books, you are helping your child unlock the door to the most amazing world.

# Libraries and bookshops

How to delve into those shelves

**WE'RE SO LUCKY** in the UK to have a wide range of bookshops and a public library in every community. If we don't all use them, they might just go away!

Booksellers, especially those in specialist children's bookshops, KNOW about books.

- Talk to them and encourage your children to ask questions. Tell the bookseller what's been read and enjoyed in the past and ask for suggestions if you're not sure what to choose.
- Books are usually arranged under quite loose headings 0–5, 6–8, information books and so on and where you look will depend on your child's reading skills and taste.
- Don't rush it; go in with plenty of time as the browsing can be fun.
  Bookshops can't stock everything but can always order and get any book you want very quickly.

It is of course very important for every child to have a personal book collection at home but you can't buy everything!

• Library membership is free and several books can be borrowed at a time.

- Make sure you and your children are library members so that you can take advantage of the great choice and service they offer.
- Libraries often run events for children – storytelling, meetthe-author sessions, etc – children love meeting authors and illustrators so look out for opportunities.
- If your child is looking for a special book, do a computer search to see if it's there – ask the librarian for help the first time if you need to.

Finding books

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- Children will know from school how books are arranged in the library – and probably how to use the computer – and regular visits will soon get them used to the layout – but always ask if you need help.
- Libraries also run a Reading Challenge during the summer holidays – take your children along and encourage them to complete the challenge. There's a different theme each year with lots of reading suggestions and incentives too!

#### Now your child can read

BEING ABLE to turn the squiggles on the pages into words, sentences and stories gives children an amazing sense of achievement. Celebrate this with them. The pattern of shared reading time changes as your child's skills develop. Soon you will be reading a paragraph or a poem each. Carry on reading together even when your child is an independent reader:

- Share in the school reading. Listen to your child and discuss what's been read as you sign off the record book.
- Carry on home reading too, reading whatever your child chooses.
- Introduce books about the things your child is interested in.
- Never give up on picture books; share them alongside the new chapter books your child is proud to read.
- Reading broadens out and you'll soon be enjoying poetry, non-fiction, stories and picture books together.

#### **Keeping them reading**

If you've always been a part of your child's reading life, this will be easy. Reading with you will be as everyday as eating and going to school – enjoy it as long as your child will let you!

- Give a book token as part of any celebration – and trust children to choose well. Don't be the adult in the bookshop who tells a young person what to read.
- Grin and bear it when they choose horror books or something you don't like; the development of individual taste is important.
- Point them in the direction of all sorts of books – if children read widely they'll soon know what they like and don't like.
- Don't be embarrassed to be seen reading a children's book – and not only Harry Potter!
- Be a good role model, be seen reading too – books, newspapers, magazines, catalogues, computer manuals, whatever...
- Remember, you don't always read challenging books so why should children – encourage them to read a range too.

The more young people enjoy reading in a relaxed atmosphere the more they'll want to read – encourage reading with a light touch.

#### **Choosing the best books**

 As your child starts school and sets off on the reading journey, he/she will bring books home from school but do carry on reading and choosing books together at home.

- Pick up on anything from school that interests your child – if it's a book about dinosaurs you could look for another dinosaur story or a book of dinosaur poems.
- Continue with any character books you've enjoyed together – Charlie and Lola or Harry and the Dinosaurs perhaps – and soon your child will be doing the reading. Try reading a paragraph or a page in turn to start with.
- As well as picture books, look for storybooks with illustration on every page, or speech bubbles. Early readers find it easier to cope if the text is broken up – too many words can put off the very new reader.
- Collections of short stories and poetry are good. It can be so liberating to be allowed to browse instead of reading the whole book.
- Encourage the reading of familiar, quite easy books – every success in reading gives children more confidence to move on.
- Carry on reading to your child regularly and encourage them to choose a longer, more challenging book for this purpose – a novel of which you can read a chapter at a time perhaps. Try something like Anne Fine's The Diary of a Killer Cat.
- Celebrate your child's choices and keep the reading time a pleasure.

- 3. Show what you write to people you respect. Listen to what they say.

#### What are your hobbies?

Watching football – especially Arsenal. I like the way football is full of surprises, scares, drama. Collecting books – I like the way a book is like a storehouse of ideas.

#### If you hadn't been a writer, what do you think you would have been?

Probably a teacher. My parents were teachers and for a time it looked like it was the only thing I could do.

It is quite possible that one of your parents will loudly and repeatedly forbid you to read one of the classics in the hope that you will throw a rebellious strop and go and read it anyway. This tactic is easy to spot as your dad will possibly be winking at your mum or doing a little self-satisfied jig as he gives his performance. As before it is quite OK for you to read this book, but never be caught doing it. It is always a good idea to have a fake cover lying around somewhere in case your dad is one of those who bursts into your room unannounced.

But for the most part you will be left to choose your own books, though these choices will rarely be totally free from the influence of peers, marketeers or bookshop attendants. You have to be selective in your choices and take advice from people who might know what they're talking about. For example, never join a book circle where you have to wear a costume or do a secret handshake. Too much hard work. Reading shouldn't be hard work; it should be fun. So, who do you listen to? Librarians are good. Booksellers too. But I usually went on the recommendations of trusted friends or, failing that, girls that I really liked and wanted to like me.

Also don't get stuck in a book rut. For a while there in my teens I only read fantasy books, which was very enjoyable, but after a while I began to refer to my friends as elves.

But do continue to read, that above all else. So often young, smart, good-looking readers get to their late teens and jack the whole lot in, in favour of lounging around in a cool fashion and staying stuff like:

'Wot you doin'?'

'Nuffink, wot you doin'?'

*Nuffink, wot you doin'?'* This can go on for several weeks and lead to repetitive jaw disorder.

When you hit that read-or-don'tread crossroads, which is more of a Y junction really, choose the read branch and stay on it for life, because if you don't there is a real possibility that you could get more stupider with every passing day of doing nuffink.

Is it adventure you're seeking — or do you want to laugh out loud? Do you like graphic novels or war stories, something fantastic or moving or mindblowing? Well, look no further. Confident readers of all ages will love what's coming next.

Whereas if you continue to leaf the trees (which is a cool way to say reading I thought of, because you leaf through pages that are made of trees – funny, eh? Sometimes I crack myself up, which is embarrassing when you're in a room of people who don't get the joke and don't laugh even when you explain it and occasionally send you to your room, even when it's your house) then your brain will expand with knowledge and wit and people will gravitate towards you at parties.

The problem with this whole introduction is that I am a parent and therefore you will ignore everything I say no matter how charmingly it is presented. And so my final act is to forbid you to read. I FORBID it. Do you hear me, young scamps? No reading for you. Off to bed now and stay thick for the rest of your lives. Wink wink, jiggedy jig.
