

Masters of Disguise


Animals use camouflage to hide themselves from their predators or their prey!

Stick insects look exactly like branches or twigs, allowing them to blend in perfectly with their natural habitat. Some can measure up to 55 cm long.



A chameleon's skin changes colour if it is frightened or angry, or if it is affected by light or temperature. It also changes its skin colour to communicate.

Turtles and tortoises use camouflage to blindside their prey and hide from large predators like alligators. One of their favourite disguises is as a rock on the bottom of the sea bed.



Snowy owls have a coat of snow-white feathers to keep them safe from predatory foxes and wolves.



The coral waters that surround Indonesia are the perfect place for pygmy seahorses to stay disguised.
